




# Less than a Quarter of the House GOP's Tax Rate Reduction Proposal Would Go to the Poorest 60 Percent of Taxpayers GOP Proposal Also Includes Counterproductive Tax Cuts for Business and Well-Off UI Recipients

#### **National and State-by-State Fact Sheets in Appendix**

On Friday, January 23, House Republican Leader John Boehner (OH) and Republican Whip Eric Cantor (VA) presented their "Economic Recovery Plan" to President Obama. The Republican plan is based on income tax cuts for relatively well-off families, and business tax cuts. As a result, it is unlikely to provide the needed boost to consumption that economists believe can come from either direct government spending or putting money in the hands of working class people who are likely to spend it quickly.

The House GOP plan proposes to reduce the two lowest individual income tax rates from 15% to 10% and from 10% to 5%. To get the maximum tax cut of about \$3,400 from this rate reduction, taxpayers would have to have enough taxable income to reach the start of the third income tax bracket. For example, a married couple with two children would typically need to earn more than \$100,000. That's considerably more than most people earn. In fact, only one in five of all taxpayers has enough income to reach the third income tax bracket and receive the full benefit of the proposed tax rate reduction.<sup>2</sup>



<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup>Even extremely high-income taxpayers will benefit somewhat from the reductions in rates in the lower tax brackets. This is because all of the progressive income tax rates apply to taxable income. For example, taxable income up to a specific amount is taxed at the lowest rate, then the remaining taxable income up to a specific amount is taxed at the second to lowest rate, and so on. The only exception occurs when a taxpayer has Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) liability that is greater than her income tax liability, meaning rate reductions in the regular income tax rates will be of no benefit.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup>The percentage of tax filers who have enough taxable income to fill up the bottom two income tax brackets varies by family status. In 2006, the IRS reports that 29% of married filers, 19% of childless single filers, and 6% of single-parent filers had taxable income in the third tax bracket.

The plan boasts that this tax break will result in "every taxpaying-family in America" enjoying an "immediate increase in their income." Architects of this proposal exclude from their definition of a "taxpaying-family" those who pay federal payroll and excise taxes but who do not earn enough to owe federal income taxes. The income tax rate reduction provides *no* benefits to a family unless their earnings are high enough to place them in the 10 percent income tax rate bracket. For a family of four, this means pretax income must be over \$26,000. The same family's pretax income would have to exceed \$42,700 to place them in the 15% bracket.

On the other hand, the plan proposed by Democrats in the House of Representatives (which is scheduled to come to a floor vote today), delivers tax cuts to working families who don't pay federal income tax but pay a lot in payroll taxes. For example, the "Making Work Pay Credit" would give married couples with \$8,100 or more in wages the full \$1,000 credit provided in the bill. In order to have an equivalent benefit from the Republican rate reduction, a married couple (with two children) would have to have \$46,000 of gross income. The House Democrats' plan would also expand the Child Tax Credit (CTC) and the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) which are smaller tax breaks in terms of revenue but are even more targeted to working families.<sup>4</sup>

The tax cuts in the House Democratic plan are more targeted to the families who need help the most—and who are most likely to immediately spend their tax savings, boosting the economy. Tax cuts that benefit higher-income taxpayers are more likely to be saved than spent on necessities like food, clothing, transportation, housing, and utilities.

#### **Provisions in the House GOP Plan to Help "Small Business"**

The Republican plan proposes to allow a "small business" to take a tax deduction of 20 percent of its pretax income, whether the small business is a corporation or a sole proprietor. The plan defines a "small business" as one with 500 or fewer employees. It makes no distinction based on income. A "small business" making \$100 million would get to deduct \$20 million of its income right off the top. (Apparently, a company with slightly more than 500 employees would have an incentive to lay off staff to qualify for the tax break!)

The Republican leadership notes that "small businesses can pay up to 35% of their income in taxes to the federal government." But for a sole proprietor to be in the 35% income tax bracket, she would need *taxable* income (after deducting all expenses) in excess of \$372,950. And because of the graduated tax brackets, her effective rate would be much less. For a corporation to be in a 35% tax bracket, *taxable* income must exceed \$10 million. The architects of this proposal have an expansive definition of the word "small" to say the very least.

The plan description also states that the United States corporate tax rate ranks the 29th highest (out of 30) among the major economies of the world. Corporations currently pay federal income taxes at a statutory rate of 35 percent. But the *effective* rate paid by corporations (the percentage of income paid in taxes after taking into account the deductions and credits and other breaks that lower their tax liability) is far lower than 35 percent.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup>Couples with two children get four personal exemptions of \$3,650 each, for a total of \$14,600, plus a "standard deduction" of \$11,400. Thus the first \$26,000 in reported income is not taxed. Better-off taxpayers can substitute itemized deductions for the standard deduction if their itemized deductions are bigger.

Comparing corporate taxes as a share of gross domestic product (as a share of the overall economy), the United States actually ranks low compared to other developed nations.<sup>5</sup>

It's also worth pointing out that a 20% deduction unnecessarily complicates the tax code. Congress could simply amend code sections that are already in the law (like the corporate or individual tax rates). Anti-tax lawmakers may be afraid that a simple corporate income tax rate cut might not go over too well with a public that believes large corporations got us into the current economic downturn.

Last, but not least, a business tax cut is just about the least effective stimulus measure Congress could possibly enact. The tax cuts put more money in the hands of business. But there is very little correlation between a corporation's cash position and its plans for investment—whether expanding capacity or hiring new employees. Businesses invest in expansion when they believe there will be an increase in the demand for the goods and services they provide. If they don't anticipate a sales increase, they won't expand no matter how many tax breaks the federal government gives them.

# House GOP Plan Would Allegedly Preclude Tax Increases Now *or in the Future* to Pay for Any Stimulus Spending

Anti-tax lawmakers are apparently worried that the House Democratic stimulus plan will be the undoing of the Bush tax cuts, even though it includes no tax increases. President Obama and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi have indicated that the Bush tax cuts should be eventually repealed for the wealthiest Americans (roughly the richest 2.5% of taxpayers). Citizens for Tax Justice pointed out even during Obama's election campaign that extending the Bush tax cuts for everyone else is an expensive and ill-advised proposition, and that was even before we knew Congress was going to spend over \$800 billion to stimulate the economy.

The House GOP plan says that any stimulus law should "include a provision precluding any tax increases now or in the future to pay for" the huge spending that is included. Of course, this is mere political posturing. Lawmakers know full well that no law they pass can restrain this Congress or any future Congress from eventually raising revenue to pay down the massive debt that the federal government is accumulating in its efforts to kick-start the economy.

More importantly, the national debt that will accumulate as a result of this stimulus bill pales in comparison to the debt piled up during the Bush administration, of which the Bush tax cuts account for about half.<sup>8</sup> Federal taxes will need to be raised eventually, but that has very little to do with the stimulus proposals being debated this week.

#### Eliminating Taxes on Unemployment Benefits: Sounds Like a Nice Idea Until You Read the Fine Print

The House GOP plan proposes to eliminate federal income taxes on unemployment insurance benefits. This seems like a reasonable idea to anyone who doesn't stop to think about it.

Surely the best way to target aid to those who could use some help is to target aid by income. But every aspect of the income tax already is targeted by income.

Very low-income people do not have to pay any income tax, and excluding any form of income from taxation obviously offers the greatest benefits to those in the highest income brackets. The people most likely to benefit from an income tax break for UI benefits are those who earned a great deal before being laid off, or those with a high-earning spouse.

Consider two married couples, each with income of \$100,000. One couple has \$95,000 in earnings for the year and \$5,000 in UI benefits, while the other couple has \$100,000 in earnings. There is no reason why one couple should need a tax break more than the other, but the House GOP plan would give a tax break to the couple that has some UI benefits, but not the other couple despite their identical incomes.

To think of this a different way, consider an executive who makes \$200,000 or so during the year, and is then laid off for a few months. She would receive a tax break equal to 28% of the unemployment benefits she receives because she is in the 28 percent income tax bracket. The same is true of someone who is laid off for the full year but is married to a spouse who earns \$200,000 that year.

Now consider the family of four in the example on page one. If their income (including UI benefits) is less than \$26,000, they would receive no benefit at all from this tax break. If their income is between \$26,000 and \$42,700 for the year, this tax break is only worth 10% of UI benefits to them because they are in the 10 percent income tax bracket.

#### First-Time Home-Buyers Credit Not Likely to Be Very Effective

The House GOP plan calls for "a home-buyers credit of \$7,500 for those buyers who can make a minimum down-payment of 5%." Just as reducing income tax rates only helps families with enough income to fall within the income tax brackets, the same is true of tax credits (if they're not refundable). It's true that tax credits (even non-refundable ones) are more progressive than deductions or exclusions of certain kinds of income from taxation. But non-refundable credits are poorly targeted to people who actually need help. The higher a family's income tax, the more likely it is that they can use the maximum credit.

The home foreclosure law enacted last summer included a temporary refundable \$7,500 credit for first-time home buyers that must be paid back in equal installments over the next 15 years, and the House Democrats' stimulus bill would waive this payback requirement for most beneficiaries. It's quite unclear how helpful any of this is, partly because it does not make any money available at the time a down payment is made but is claimed when the buyer files his tax return the following year.

#### Tax Cuts Are Not the Best Stimulus, But Some Tax Cuts Are Better than Others


As Moody's economist Mark Zandi illustrated in a report released just last week, *not one* of the tax cuts that have been discussed recently would stimulate the economy as much as *any one* of the possible spending increases that are commonly discussed. For example, every dollar in federal revenue lost because of a corporate tax cut would increase the GDP by only 30 cents. But a dollar spent on increased unemployment compensation would increase GDP by \$1.63.<sup>9</sup>

To the extent that Congress feels compelled to cut taxes, however, the sort of tax proposals included in the House Democrats' plan promise to be far more effective than those proposed by House GOP leaders. This is because the Democrats' plan would immediately put money in the hands of those who are most likely spend it quickly — low- and middle-income working families.

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
